This, part of a series of one day workshops, is aimed at archaeologists and heritage professionals and will introduce basic zooarchaeological methods and theory.

It is designed for those actively involved in fieldwork, project design, management, post excavation work or curatorial-related work. There will be talks and training by **leading experts in the field of Zooarchaeological studies** including Robin Bendrey, Catherine Smith and Cat Irving.

There will also be opportunities for participants to discuss their own experiences in excavating or working with lithics as well as handle teaching collections and artefacts, all with the aim of sharing best practice in archaeological and museum settings.

## Topics covered:

When you register you will be asked to provide some information to help tailor the training. This will ensure that what you learn on the day will be relevant to your everyday work.

Topics covered could include; animal bone identification, collection & handling (in the field, during post excavation, in museums), recording procedures, what information is retrievable, how to decode faunal data in specialist reports and use it in wider reporting (including site level interpretations), archival policy, what happens to collections in storage, where to look for further study and research and more!
